October Worship Focus: Trust in the Grace of Christ A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARGUERITE

Happy Fall, HMPC friends and family!

You may feel like it was only by the grace of Christ that you survived one of the hottest stretches of weather on record in Raleigh. All the more reason to welcome fall with the love of Christ, I think! Every fall, HMPC has many special events and this year is no exception – I wanted to highlight a few.

As we continue study of our vision statement, October's theme is **"trust in the grace of Christ."** That coincides nicely with the launch of our 2027 Giving Campaign this Sunday. How can we give such precious treasures such as our time and money to the church without trusting in the grace of Christ? The grace which catches us when we're too focused on our own wants and not enough on our neighbor's needs, the grace that helps us receive as well as give.



Members of the Giving Team will help lead in worship throughout the season, and on **October 4**, the Mission team will step in to help lead a World Communion Sunday focused on how your giving supports people outside the walls of HMPC. I'll be joined by Raleigh Rescue Mission CEO John Luckett for a dialogue sermon to learn more about how HMPC support goes out into a community of people who may not even know about HMPC. World Communion Sunday always invites us to see beyond the walls of our own church and having Raleigh Rescue Mission as our guest, prior to the Rise Against Hunger meal packing event, is a great fit for the theme of the day.



On **October 11**, we actually WILL go outside our walls to celebrate those who almost never come inside our walls – our animals, both domestic and in nature will be blessed and prayed over. (The exceptions may be a few dogs and a few squirrels who find themselves in the building). Worship team is planning this outside service on the west lawn and asks everyone to bring a chair, a pet or a picture of a pet, and celebrate all of God's creation.

Rev. Jimmy Hulsey, as chair of the Giving Team, will bring our message on **October 18**, lifting up this year's theme of "Rooted in Christ, Growing in Generosity." I can't stress the importance of this year's campaign enough. Candidates looking at coming to HMPC are going to be very interested in the financial and volunteer support the congregation provides. If you have never pledged, please give prayerful consideration whether this year is the year to try it. If you have pledged we thank you and hope you will prayerfully consider whether an increase could be possible for 2027. Rev. Jimmy has told me how impressed he is with HMPC members' generosity and I look forward to his message that day.



We round out October with more celebration – **Oct. 25** is Reformation Sunday with bagpipes, followed by the Youth Group's pancake brunch fundraiser and the Fall Festival at St Mark's UMC. Reformation Sunday means so much to us who find the most honest Christian home is one of the Presbyterian Reformed tradition that admits to our limits and brokenness at the same time living into the good news of the gospel. I hope to see all of you in worship during a full and festive October!

What's a Wiggle Room Anyway?

You may have noticed a new space at church called the Wiggle Room. So, what exactly is it?

The Wiggle Room is an updated take on what churches have traditionally called a “cry room.” It is an inclusive worship space where people of all ages can step out when they need a little extra room, privacy, quiet, or flexibility—while still remaining connected to the worship service through the livestreaming of the service inside the room. It is located in the narthex near the accessible entrance.

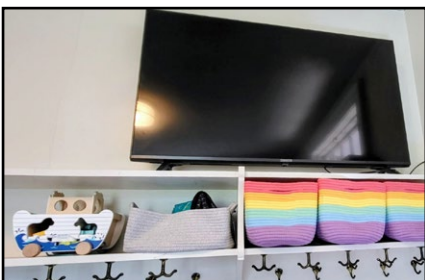
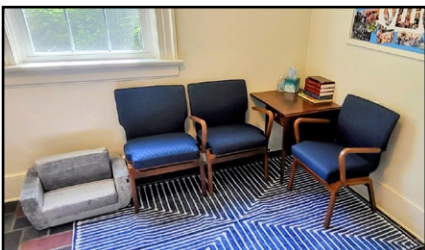
For families with young children, the Wiggle Room offers a place where little ones can move, play quietly, or take a break while parents and caregivers continue to participate in worship. It can also provide a more private and comfortable space for parents who need to breastfeed or care for a baby. There are diaper changing supplies, toys, and soft seating available to help make your family comfortable.

But the Wiggle Room isn't just for children. There may be Sundays when an adult has a tickle in their throat, needs a little extra space, or simply finds that worshipping from a quieter environment is more comfortable. The Wiggle Room makes it possible to still hear the service, participate in worship, and still be a part of the community. You will find Bibles, Hymnals, and a Friendship Pad on the table.

Most importantly, the Wiggle Room is not a place where anyone is being sent because they don't belong in worship. It is an extension of our worship space and another way we

can make room for one another.

As Presbyterians, we believe that the church is a community where all are welcome—and sometimes, welcoming means making a little extra room. Whether you are wiggly, nursing, feeling crowded, or simply in need of a different space, there is a place for you here.

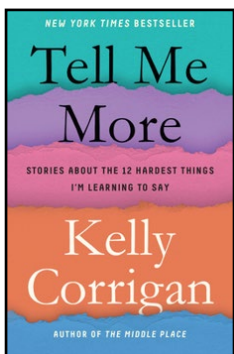
