Marguerite Sirrine will describe key findings, answer your questions and lead small group brainstorming sessions.

The congregation's response to the CAT survey was very impressive—231 completed assessments—and told us that you are interested and engaged in planning the future of your church. Your answers to the many questions indicated two fundamental qualities: a high level of satisfaction, the sense of joy and passion for Hudson's worship and mission, and equally high energy, the spirit of the congregation that makes people want to be involved in its mission and ministries.

Hudson's strengths.

As a reminder, the community leaders we interviewed told us that 1.) churches are models of belonging and inclusion and can offer connection to new residents and those feeling isolated; and 2.) partnering with other organizations is a good way to extend our outreach, especially in underserved neighborhoods. The CAT results tell us that we have many strengths as a church. Bring your own ideas to share and we will collect them.



upcoming Sunday four times, with interspersed questions: What's a word or phrase that stands out to you? Allow that word or phrase to develop into a memory from your life, a thought you have on the passage or a metaphor? What is Christ calling you to through the passage?

No previous Bible study experience is necessary. At inperson meetings we provide coffee and Bibles. On Zoom we invite you to use an online Bible or pull out your own hard copy and brew some joe at home. It's a great way to deepen your faith and develop friendships within the church! New participants are always welcome.

referring to? Are these the Old Testament?



This fall, the Presbyterian Ponderings class is studying the Acts of the Apostles, guided by *Life Lessons* from Acts written by Max Lucado. We will look at the struggles and successes of the early church and examine how the foundations of our faith, established by Christ, were shared.

Philip is a newly minted evangelist for the young church, and he has visions of converting the hoards and healing the masses. What makes him decide to approach an exotic stranger who is reading the Bible and ask, "Do you understand what you are reading?", and what miracle does it lead to? Join us this Sunday as we examine Acts 8.

## The Seekers

This Sunday, October 26 9:30am | WH South "God's Story and Our Stories"



In church or on our own, we often read the Bible in snippets. Our sermons are regularly based on the Revised Common Lectionary, so we again are considering Scripture in snippets. I am not saying there is anything

wrong with this way of attending to Biblical texts. But the stories of the Bible, or Biblical narrative, come to us in larger format, taking a number of chapters to present Abraham and Sarah, Rebekkah and Jacob, Naomi and Ruth, Samuel, Saul and David, not to forget Jesus Christ in the gospel narratives.

Our class in October will consider the Rebekkah/Jacob story as a whole (Genesis 24-33). I invite each class member to read those chapters to get a sense of the whole story. Our purpose is to read the story on its own terms. What is it telling us about the characters and events as God moves with them and oftentimes allows them center stage and the foreground?

Recently in a sermon, Marguerite used the phrase "Intrepid Interpretation." Let's read Biblical narrative with a desire for intrepid or bold interpretation to see what the Spirit may be saying first to us through the stories themselves in their context and from their worldview. Before we subject the Bible to our demand of immediate relevance or that it fit our modern criteria of facts and evidence, what does it say as a strong literary piece?

Following the theologian Hans Frei, we may have lost a way to read Biblical narrative on its own terms in our efforts to make it fit our world. He called this "The Eclipse of Biblical Narrative." In demanding to see the text according to our familiar viewpoints, we may have obscured a bolder way of reading it. Wonder of wonders, we may encounter God in an old story for a new day.
