JANUARY 2, 2026

January 4, Epiphany Sunday, celebrates the journey of the Magi from the Far East to the manger in Bethlehem. They followed the light of a star to see the light of Christ in a dark and

dismissed place. "Epiphany" is a word that means a sudden insight into the presence of God or the truth of a situation. It's the kind of truth that sets us free from being misguided or wrong or just being in the dark about the situation we're in.

And how fitting that on Epiphany Sunday, the Session will be meeting to discuss the Mission Study Report that was submitted to them by the Mission Study Team on December 18! According to our CAT cultural profile, HMPC is a "Magi church" – a church of seekers, a church of thinkers, and once convinced, a church of persistent doers. The Mission Study Report should provide all of us with epiphanies to work with throughout 2026: the number of people still missing Mac, the number of people at HMPC desiring change, the yearning of the congregation for a little more flexibility even as changes introduce discomfort. The truth sets us free, true, but it often brings some loss with that freedom – we lose a familiar road, safe habits, a sense of direction we'd thought was right but now plainly see needs to change. The wise men lost valuable assets when they deposited their gifts with the Christ child. That's a reminder that no matter what our epiphany leads us to change, Christ will take our hopes and dreams and redeem them into something that glorifies God and lifts up the world. That's a vision worth working toward!

In worship this Sunday, you will receive your Star Word



for the year, and we will continue to look at the many prisms we find in the light of the world coming to us at Christmas. Happy New Year, and may you have all the epiphanies you need for abundant life in 2026.


December's Collection for Healing Transitions

9:30 - Presbyterian Ponderings - WH North



Worship Themes for the New Year

Each January, the Christian liturgical calendar begins with Epiphany Sunday to celebrate those "God moments" when we feel we've seen God or evidence of God that transforms how we see things (the story of the Magi in Matthew's gospel), followed by the Baptism of the Lord Sunday, when Scripture tells the story of John the Baptist baptizing Jesus in the Jordan. The sermon title for Jan. 4 is "The Seekers" and Jan. 11 is "The Messes." The human relationship with the divine takes us on a journey; it also acquaints us with the messes we make along the way.

January 18, we'll start a sermon series that takes a closer Scriptural look at our new vision statement and how we can start living into it right away. That Sunday, the sermon "First of All," will examine the role of "Christ" in the statement and in human life. January 25, the sermon "One of Many" will take on division in the church - the variety of belief and perspective that we can either welcome or not. On February 1, the focus will turn to what makes diversity of belief and perspective become the great unifying force - nothing less than Jesus Christ our Lord.

I'm so looking forward to diving into study and mission next year that move this congregation closer to its vision of bringing God's kingdom to North Hills.
