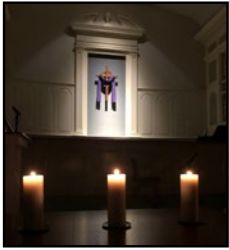

HOLY WEEK UPDATES FOR 2026



Friends, we wanted to let you know that at their last committee meeting, the Worship team decided not to have the Good Friday noon worship service this year. We based the decision on two sets of numbers: the number of full-time pastoral staff we currently have, and the numbers of people who have been attending the service. Both are lower than we think they need to be to support this service in addition to our other planned Holy Week services - Maundy Thursday Tenebrae, ecumenical Easter Sunrise and two HMPC Easter Sunday services. Since Easter is on the first Sunday of April this year, Session also approved the Worship team recommendation for moving the sacrament of communion to the following Sunday, April 12. HMPC has traditionally chosen to do this. We appreciate all who would rather have communion on Easter, as well as those who've made the effort to attend the Good Friday service over the years. Worship Committee would want to invite you and everyone to please mark your calendars for the Maundy Thursday Tenebrae service (4/2 at 7:00pm) which will include both a more intimate serving of communion and the reading of the passion story amidst gathering darkness. Please let us know if you have any questions about the schedule and we look forward to worshipping with you in faith and truth this Lenten and Easter season.

LENTEN SERMON THEME

FEBRUARY 22 - MARCH 29: "FULFILLMENT"



Lent is that Christian season of discipleship where we acknowledge the ways we tend to sabotage ourselves and our world, giving into temptations that prevent us from fulfilling God's plan for us. The sermon series explores the idea of fulfillment (that word that many younger Americans use to describe what they're looking for in marriage and career), and the idea of God's vision for humankind coming to fruition, especially through Jesus Christ. 2026 Lenten Devotional: Discipleship in a Divided Age



In a world marked by division, uncertainty and competing narratives, Matthew's Gospel speaks with striking relevance. Matthew's first audience — a young, fragile community navigating conflict, identity and fear — sounds a lot like the church today. This Lenten devotional by *Presbyterian Outlook* editor Teri McDowell Ott invites readers to journey through Matthew's Gospel to discover how Jesus leads us toward humility, courage, compassion and faithful discipleship amid the fractures of our age.

Grounded in Scripture and written with pastoral warmth, this resource guides individuals and congregations through daily reflections, including a weekly *visio divina* practice. Each entry includes Scripture, a focus verse, a theologically rich reflection, guided questions, and a closing prayer — making it ideal for personal prayer, small groups, session devotions, or congregational Lenten study.

TRANSITIONAL MINISTRY

About The PNC Nomination Process

Now that Presbytery's Commission on Ministry has approved our Mission Study Report, HMPC can work on forming a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). This article explains where we are and what to expect next.

On February 2, Session appointed a PNC nominating subcommittee of Harry Bowles, Ken Krause, Elizabeth Peeler and Dan Vig to nominate a slate of HMPC members to the seven-person PNC. Their first meeting was held February 18.

The Session has set the number of PNC members at 7 and specified these criteria for representation:

- * Active and contributing HMPC members
- * Diversity of age and membership tenure
- * Diversity of gender and theological perspective
- * At least some leadership experience at HMPC
- * At least one person with experience in hiring processes and/or Personnel work

These representation criteria ensure that the PNC reflects as much as possible the diversity of the congregation as well as skills particular to the task of searching for and nominating a candidate for the next Head of Staff.

Because the Session has set representation criteria and a seven-person limit, not everyone nominated will be able to serve. But if you feel you or an HMPC member you know would help meet the criteria and aid the work of the PNC, you should submit a nomination **by March 15**. Paper forms will be available in the bulletin on Sunday, or you can nominate someone via online form by clicking [HERE](#).

Once the subcommittee and the Session agree on the slate of nominees to be put before the congregation, Session will schedule a congregational meeting following worship for the subcommittee to present their slate and hold the election. As you can see, the formation of the PNC is a collaborative process between the Session and the congregation, ultimately elected by and functioning as a committee of the congregation.

After the PNC's election, I will organize an orientation meeting with them and our vacancy counselor from Presbytery's Commission on Ministry, Jerry Slaymaker. Our transition process then officially moves from developing the mission study report to the work of the Pastor Nominating Committee.

The next question most congregations ask is, "How long will it take to call a new pastor?" In the post-COVID era of ministry, my answer is, "Longer than you'd probably like." But my job as your transitional pastor shifts from ensuring the completion of the Mission Study Report to ensuring that the Session acts on the report's conclusions.

That means the vision, goals and objectives you, the congregation, identified in the process, and which the Session will prioritize, will be the focus of our ministry while the PNC does its work. This enables the congregation to focus on the calling God has put before us rather than the wait for the new pastor. That work also ensures we are the church that we say we are in our job posting on the Church Leadership Connection. So no matter whether it takes nine months or two-plus years for the PNC to present its candidate to the congregation for election, HMPC will be working on living into the vision you feel God has put before you at this time.

That's an overview of the next steps in our transition process. More information will be forthcoming. In the meantime, do not hesitate to ask your Session members or your transitional pastor any questions about the process.

The work will begin after preschool on a Friday (likely the 27th) and finish on Saturday, in time for Sunday services. There may be lingering odor from the solvent afterward, which will fade.

Confirmation Class Trip: An Enriching Interfaith Experience



As part of their Confirmation journey, some of our Confirmands recently visited the Islamic Association of Raleigh. We were able to meet Muslim neighbors, hear about their faith in their own words, and see firsthand how they pray and worship as we observed an afternoon prayer service. Confirmation is not only about learning what we believe — it is also about understanding our faith in the world in which we live. Jesus calls us to love our neighbors, and in order to love our neighbors well, we must first understand them.



Engaging with other faith traditions helps strengthen our own. When we encounter different perspectives, we naturally reflect more deeply on what we believe and why. This process helps move faith from something we simply inherit to something we more fully understand and embrace. When we see how others understand prayer, scripture, and community, it encourages us to reflect more deeply on what it means to follow Christ. It's about loving neighbors, strengthening faith, and growing into mature disciples of Jesus.

Rather than fearing what is unfamiliar, they practiced curiosity. Rather than relying on stereotypes, they listened to real people.



When they seek to understand others, our youth become bridge-builders in their schools, friendships, and communities. They learn that strength and gentleness can go hand in hand—and that respectful understanding is not weakness, but wisdom. In doing so, they reflect the love of Christ in a world that deeply needs it.

Special Evening Book Study

Facilitated by Joan Lester | March 8-May 3

The Presbyterian Church enjoins us to address/eliminate systemic racism. We are offering an upcoming book study that explores a technique, called a "charrette," used to bring diverse people together to work out differences. The book is *The Best of Enemies*, the true story of C.P. Ellis, Exalted Cyclops of the Ku Klux Klan of Durham, and of Ann Atwater, a single mother from the poor black part of town, who became a dynamic black activist. They met in 1971 on opposite sides of the school integration issue, and through guided charrettes, they were each transformed. They "forged a longstanding friendship that flourished against a backdrop of unrelenting bigotry." Their story is remarkable.

The book study will occur beginning March 8 on Sunday evenings at 5:30 p.m. The first session (two hours) will involve passing out books and watching the DVD of *The Best of Enemies*. The remaining sessions will each be one



hour. We will skip Easter Sunday and go through May 3, for a total of eight sessions. The first ten people to sign up will get free books. Additional persons are welcome to sign up and can order books on Amazon, including a Kindle version. Joan Lester is conducting the book study. This past fall when we filled out surveys about our congregation, most observations were quite positive. There was, however, a need identified for greater "spiritual vitality." The class I offer this Lent is to help us understand that term.

I have chosen a highly respected Presbyterian educator to guide us. Years ago, Craig Dykstra was chosen to draft a study of Presbyterian/Reformed spirituality. He later wrote a book based on that report to the 201st General Assembly, entitled *Growing in the Life of Faith*. We will be following its topics and allowing it to inform our discussions.

What is the basis for our life in the Spirit? What does it mean to grow in faith or to mature spiritually? Is spirituality different from faith? Is it more emotional than intellectual? Does it entail a different style of worship? Is it more or less churchy? Is it focused more on the individual and less on the community or society? How can Presbyterians be more spiritual? What guidelines from our Presbyterian/Reformed faith are there? Can spirituality even be taught?

I offer these classes for our hearts and minds to prepare again to receive new life at Easter. We will gather in the Seekers location: Westminster South at 9:30am, Sundays, February 22 thru March 29. Since the class was inspired by a congregational survey, all are especially welcome.

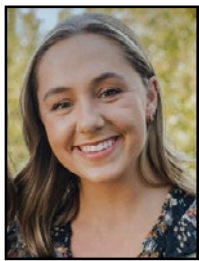
