





NUMBER OF HOUSEHOLDS, NUMBER OF MEMBERS AVERAGE WEEKLY ATTENDANCE IN WORSHIP








Number of visiting families who attended in-person worship and signed the Friendship pad



2023 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS


- Pledge Income reduced by \$20K due to inflationary pressures (2.5% decrease from 2022). Still the 2nd highest dollar amount pledged since 2000.
- Non Pledge Offering at \$95K (65% increase from 2022)
- Total General Fund Revenue increased by \$36K (3.9% increase from 2022)
- Total General Fund Expenses increased \$76.5K (8.2% increase from 2022). General Fund Expenses are outpacing General Fund Revenue.
- Projected Deficit of \$40K
- Staff will receive a 2% increase compared to 2022
- Staff will receive an additional 3% bonus (Bonus was completely funded by an anonymous donation designated for this purpose and does not contribute to the Projected Deficit)

In September I completed my 13th full year as Hudson's Pastor & Head of Staff. I am writing this during the liturgical season of Epiphany. Epiphany is a time when we reflect on God's light in the world. The Magi followed a star to Jesus. This annual report helps us as a church reflect on how we as Christians are bearing Christ's light into the world through Hudson.

It's a healthy practice to look back on a year to see what you've done, and how it might impact what one does moving forward. This year was unique in that I stepped away from Hudson for a three-month Session-approved sabbatical. As our Staff Policy Manual states, (Sabbatical) "is an opportunity for the individual to strategically disengage from regular and normal tasks so that ministry and mission may be viewed from a new perspective because of a planned time to focus. It is an extension of the Biblical concept of a Sabbath day. It is both an act of faith that God will sustain us through a period of reflection and changed activity and an occasion for recovery and renewal of vital energies."

For the nine months I was not on sabbatical, here are some statistics of what I did:

In 2022, my sermon series included a four-part Epiphany series on Star Gifts (January), a three-part series on African-American Presbyterian Minister John Chavis (February), a seven-part Lenten Series called Good News (March-April), and a four-part Advent Series on Types of Waiting (December).

Some of my teaching/leading included Being Reformed: Theology of Presbyterians, Being Reformed: Belhar Confession, discussions on Heaven & Hell: A History of the Afterlife by Bart D. Ehrman, Visio & Lectio Divina with The Saint John's Bible, a Lenten Labyrinth series at various locations in the City of Raleigh, a Session Goal-Setting Retreat and a blessing service of the new Chapel Labyrinth in December. A great joy of 2022 was starting the Coffee & Conversation post-worship parent group with Cary Dickerson. This has been a wonderful place for parents to deepen their relationships with one another while discussing faith topics.

Outside the walls of HMPC, I served on the Exams & Transfers Sub-Commission of the Presbytery of New Hope, led the training of 224th General Assembly Commissioners for Presbytery of New Hope, moderated Blacknell Presbyterian Church Session while they are between pastors, coordinated the Six Forks Clergy Group, and was a co-coordinator of Raleigh's local chapter of American Pilgrims on the Camino.




The Presence of the Spirit in 2022

2022 continued to be a year of flexibility, innovation and improvisation as we adjusted to Covid challenges and opportunities. The Spirit was active as increasing numbers of people found us online, experiencing wonderful worship and caring fellowship many thought possible only in person. Communicating authentically in a virtual world speaks to the creativity and energy of staff and volunteers.

Collaboration with new staff who came on board during this year was also a place the Spirit was present as we became a team while tending to our particular areas. Working closely with the Stewardship/Homecoming team was inspirational as ideas took shape, plans came together, and the Homecoming event was well received. Observing the Deacons grow into their calls as care givers has been inspiring during this past year.

My Role at Hudson & in the Greater Community - Highlights of 2022

• I am the staff liaison to the following committees and groups: PW, Adult Education, Deacons, Fellowship, Hudson Connects, and Mission. I fill in for Mac



- I enjoy facilitating two vibrant Women at the Well groups, and serving as a resource for the facilitators of the Sunday morning offerings, selecting topics and materials from various sources. I am also available to assist women's circles with the annual Bible study and other resources they use. I lead the Sunday morning classes when asked, usually on a topic or season of interest; 2022 included both Lent and Advent sessions. A group of women attend the annual Women's Connection Conference in Montreat with me.
- Like all the staff, I worked hard at discerning how to go forward with the increased expectations of what we can do technologically while still being available and nurturing relationships in person.
- Ministry with Deacons includes orientation and ongoing education, creating their Lent and Advent worship services and putting together the annual Deacon retreat.
- Sharing sacred times with individuals and families is at the core of pastoral ministry and on any given week may include meeting with visitors, getting to know new members, having conversation with members, providing assistance to someone in need who comes to our door, planning for and officiating memorial services and baptisms.
- As much as there is to do that has an inward focus of care, education, worship, administration etc., all of which I do, our ultimate goal is to focus *outward*. To that end, I work with the Interfaith Coalition whose primary task is the annual Habitat build. I provide educational opportunities for members to consider the work of peace and justice on a broad scale, as I did in the Sunday evening classes I facilitated where we explored difficult issues through theological and cultural lenses.
- I am connected to the Food and Faith Ministry, a multi-faith initiative that is consistent with our Hunger Action Commitment.
- I engage with those inquiring about membership and find the in-depth conversations with them to be rewarding.
- I continue to spend time with colleagues and other church professionals through professional development both in person and online. In 2022 I attended the Next Church Conference in Montreat, a group of forward-thinking Presbyterians who are discerning the role of the church in the 21st century.
- Serving in ministry beyond HMPC is a requirement of my call and it is one both I and our congregation benefit from. I serve on a Presbytery Committee and assist larger church leadership with various events when asked. I enjoyed being on the planning team for a multi church event held at White Memorial last spring.

Our Organist Search was also fruitful last year. The Search Committee was composed of Emily Brown, Carol Cox and Dan Vig with extra help from Carol Yeargin and Martha Chapman. Our search culminated in offering the position to Al Hyde. He began with us in January 2023.

I feel very blessed to be with you in ministry in this little corner of God's Kingdom. I am looking forward to another wonderful year of music-making.

We have gained some momentum and rhythm in the past twelve months since the pandemic, and continually have hope in the enduring love and resilience of God and God's people, living in community.


Here are the highlights of our past year together:

The winter and early spring of 2022 brought some snow which delayed our programs, but after the melt, we started the process of planning for **Youth Sunday** worship with a theme called "**We Are Here**" on February 27. It was a wonderful celebration of God's gifts seen and heard in these young people who led us all in the glorification of God.

Confirmation Sunday saw the congregation reaffirm their commitment to care for, educate, have fun with, and love twelve young people as the Confirmation Class of 2022. This was a beautiful Sunday where their mentors, parents AND "church" family gathered around and celebrated them for who they are as children of God, and pledged to be there for them presently and in the future, as they have in the past.

Confirmation 2023 was put on hold for a year due to low numbers on the roles in the rising 8th grade class. In turn, a **Confirmation Ministry Team** was formed to vision, plan and execute our next Confirmation Class. The members of that team are as follows: Sean Cole, Becca Fisher-Gabbard, Karen Melling, Tim Peeler, Yana Soler.

The Middle School youth attended the **Middle School Conference at Massanetta** in Massanutten, VA, while the High School youth attended the **Montreat Youth Conference** in mid-July. The Montreat Conference theme was "More Than Enough". This was a wonderful week of small groups, worship, music,



and fellowship. A new sustainable youth ministry "technique" called "**Shepherds and Sheep**" has had a year to grow into this ministry and while things continue to look toward a "relational" ministry, this "system" will allow all of our adult advisors to become more connected relationally in the area of recreation, pastoral care, and "off-campus" activities.

Youth Group continued to be our Sunday evening that provided a space for EACH YOUNG PERSON to have a place to come to to be themselves which sparked an idea about a Youth Group "motto". **JUST SHOW UP AND BE** is the new motto and a way to communicate the limitless possibilities of "be-ing" with one another in community.

The Youth Committee discussed a possible new model for the way we do youth ministry at Hudson and agreed to try some things starting in the beginning of 2023. One of those "tweaks" is **Sabbath Sundays**. Sabbath Sundays are once-a-month gatherings where we encourage families to share a meal with one another (at home, at another family's home or at a restaurant) for a guided time of prayer, questions and conversation. This is IN PLACE OF a regular evening youth group at church.

In the effort to create a consolidated time for families, the **Christian Education** piece of Sunday morning has been paired with a musical ensemble opportunity. This is on a trial basis and will be assessed at the end of May 2023. **Youth Sunday school (for grades 5-12) will be from 11:30am to 12:00pm and Youth Bells will be from 12:00pm to 12:30pm.** So far, we have had positive feedback with this schedule change.

Youth Ministry is about relationships and one way to create, grow, and sustain those relationships is by supporting one another outside of church. Something new that we have recently added is a relational ministry technique called the "**Come See Me**" board. Youth are encouraged to write their names, "events" and date of special events on the board so that we all (adult advisors and youth) may attend those sporting events, musical and artistic shows and any other "event" to support and lift up one another in our gifts and talents.

In all of our efforts, our goal is to provide a safe and inclusive environment of love, freedom of thought, care, compassion and support in the name of Christ. This goal is attained by creating and sustaining relationships with our youth and would not at all be possible without the time and energy of our wonderful teachers, committee, adult advisors and leadership teams.

Finally, It is my absolute pleasure and honor to serve you in this capacity and I thank you for this apportunity.





As another calendar year comes to a close, many of us reflect back upon where we personally observed the Spirit moving in our lives this year. For many it might have been a particularly moving sermon, a favorite Bible verse, or a hymn that spoke to us. For me, where I most saw the Spirit's movement in the words and enthusiasm of the children of the church. One of the reasons I joined this particular church is because of the value placed on being an intergenerational community of faith, rather than a multigenerational one. Children at Hudson are not simply seen as the future of the church, but as valued members of our present church family with unique gifts they can use to glorify God.

Our children put their faith into action by doing Mission work alongside the larger congregation this year. As Hudson continued our Hunger Action focus,

our children participated by packing food bags for our local homeless population, assembling birthday bags for local families in need, and donating to Heifer International. As Hudson supported North Raleigh Ministries, our children collected food items for their Food Pantry during VBS. As Hudson supported the Habitat for Humanity Interfaith Build, our children painted baffles to be used to insulate Habitat homes.





As our Welcoming Committee helped newcomers navigate Hudson, our children found ways to welcome their peers. Throughout the year they color beautiful postcards to send to the children of visitors. They also create colorful tags to adorn the welcome bags we send home with visiting families. These seemingly small efforts make the children of our visitors feel seen and welcomed alongside their parents.

Our children brought their beautiful energy to singing, ushering, and reading scripture in worship. They used their creativity to make a wonderful canvas to welcome all of God's people to Hudson. They brought a youthful approach to telling the Christmas story during the Pageant. They brought their excitement for learning about God to VBS and Arts camp. They brought laughter and smiles to our many intergenerational Fellowship events. The list goes on and on. God has bestowed upon each of us gifts and talents as a part of the body of Christ, and I am proud to be part of a community of faith that values children the way Hudson does.

"I lift up my eyes to the hills - from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord." - Psalm121:1-2a

Being hospitalized, dealing with a chronic illness, facing a cancer diagnosis, having a major accident or family difficulty, confronting end of life, loneliness, etc. — all of these are times in which we need our faith more than ever. A listening ear, a shoulder to cry on, and someone to pray with and for you can be helpful during difficult times. As Hudson's Minister of Visitation I am available to visit with you on behalf of your pastoral staff. Mac and Debbie and the Deacons do a wonderful job of congregational care, but I am here to provide additional pastoral attention when requested by congregants or staff.

During 2022, 285 contacts by visits or phone calls were provided, as well as numerous undocumented conversations, emails, and cards.

Please know that we are available to you, but need to be informed of your situation in order to provide care to you. It is a privilege to visit in your homes and at your hospital bedside. It is a joy to serve as your Minister of Visitation.

The session of Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Church met 20 times during 2022. There were 10 stated meetings, seven called meetings, and three electronic meetings.

January: The 2022 budget was approved with a 4% salary increase for staff. The Hudson Memorial Preschool budget was also approved.

February: Approved changing the title for Cary Dickerson from "Interim Director of Children and Family Ministries" to "Director of Children and Family Ministries". Approved the Mission, Vision, Values, and Goals plan and communication plan.

April: Examined a class of nine confirmands and approved membership for the class. Also received the 2020 annual financial review summary completed by the Finance committee. Approved the expenditure of \$25,000 from the 2021 budget surplus to fund various mission programs of the Interfaith Food Shuttle.

September: Engaged the services of an eminent domain attorney to represent Hudson in the City of Raleigh Six Forks road-widening project.

November: Approved a proposal from the Property Committee to repair the walkways in the attic. Approved a proposal from the Personnel Committee to pay the HMPC staff bonuses equal to 2% of their current salaries.

December: Approved the housing allowance determination for 2023 for Mac Schafer and Debbie Kirk.

Matthew 25 is a PC(USA) initiative that highlights building congregational vitality, eradicating systemic poverty, and dismantling structural racism.

The Deacons of Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Church provide a ministry of care and presence to our members. While building relationships, offering encouragement and giving support to members is our core, our reflection with one another shows that we receive more than we give from those with whom we connect. Prayer is the foundation of the ministry of the Deacons. We recognize and appreciate that those who we pray for are praying for us as well. Lifting up compassionate and confidential prayers through Prayer Partners is one of the ways we care for our congregation. We make in-person visits for those members who would like them, make numerous phone calls, and send notes and cards. We also serve in-home communion to the homebound.



The Deacons host and support congregational events centered around faith and care. During Lent, the Deacons held 5 Wednesday evening prayer and scripture services which included communion and anointing with oil for those requesting special prayers. Each service was preceded by a simple supper and fellowship.

In December we offered a prayer and scripture service "Blue Christmas: A Service of Shadows" in our chapel. This was a special time of reflection and care for everyone, and especially those with heavy hearts which may be difficult to unburden during this season.

In mid-October, the Deacons had a one-day retreat led by Katherine Kussmaul at the New Hope Camp and

Conference Center (*Photo above*). The theme of the retreat was "Parched and Porous" and was a time of sharing, fellowship, and personal reflection with opportunities to walk the lovely labyrinth, walk the many trails, or simply meditate in the worship space.

The Deacons are looking forward to 2023 and where we are called to serve. We plan to continue our Lenten services and Blue Christmas service. We are always striving to provide care in many ways to our congregation and welcome suggestions from members of the congregation. The Deacons continue to "Go Forth and Serve" as our campus signs direct.

MINISTRIES SUPPORTED BY THE DEACONS:

MEMORIAL SERVICES

In partnership with the Memorial Services Guild, Deacons assist and support the grieving family before, during, and after a memorial service. Seating is reserved for Deacons during a memorial service, and all available Deacons attend the service. The Deacons assist with greeting guests and host a reception for guests following a service. During 2022, there were 12 memorial services at Hudson; the Deacons hosted 8 receptions and assisted with greeting guests for 2 services in the Memorial Garden.

PRAYER PARTNERS

Prayer Partners is a ministry in which the Deacons, Pastors and members of the congregation that have agreed to join the ministry, are contacted to lift members and their loved ones in prayer because of a prayer request. Currently, there are 75+ members of the congregation receiving the prayer requests and lifting the folks in these requests in prayer. The prayer ministry keeps us all connected and helps strengthen our relationship with God as we identify the needs, named and unnamed, of those in our congregation and beyond. Some prayer requests are for Deacons and Pastors only; these requests are forwarded only to them. Some prayer requests are marked "OK for PP" or "okay for Prayer Partners;" these are then forwarded by the PP Deacon that month to the Prayer Partners contact list. Most requests are received through Pastors and staff or the Deacons via emails, texts, phone calls and the Deacon Prayer Line, or link on the HMPC website. Prayer requests are also submitted on the blue prayer request cards in the pews.

DEACON CARD MINISTRY

Deacons send cards to those who need care, compassion, support or nurture during time of crisis, need or transition. This ministry also sends grief booklets (series of 4 booklets) to members for one year after the loss of a family member.

During 2022, the Deacon Card Ministry provided care and support by sending:

- 60 Grief Booklets to 26 family members
- 28 Healing, recovery, and comfort cards
- •19 Sympathy cards; 7 Thinking of you/prayers cards; 2 Miscellaneous cards

MEAL MINISTRY

Deacons offer to provide meals for members recovering from illness, undergoing treatment and experiencing other situations when meals would be helpful. The Deacons assigned to the meal ministry coordinate the delivery of meals through numerous members in the congregations who have volunteered to prepare and deliver meals; depending on individual circumstances or requests, meal cards are a welcome alternative since they can be used any time.

Three families were served in 2022:

- 8 meals (member experiencing temporary mobility issues)
- 2 meals (member who had surgery)
- 3 meals (family member accident) and extended into 2023 for as long as needed

SPECIAL PROJECTS

The goal of the Special Projects team is to create and/or support meaningful special projects for our congregation and community. All Deacons participate as available with special events.

- During 2022, HMPC was a co-sponsor of the care, healing and wellness event "Healing Together: An Evening with Dr. Hillary McBride" held at White Memorial Presbyterian Church on May 11. The focus of this event was to provide the practical ways to better understand and deal with the some of the issues Covid-19 was causing and/or making more acute.
- Nominate the Older Adult Recognition recipient from HMPC. The recipient is honored by New Hope Presbytery in May each year. Sandy Geiger was the recipient in 2022. (See photo on the cover!)
- Arrange for delivery of poinsettias to members who may need extra cheer during the Christmas season. Deacons delivered over 25 poinsettias to members in 2022.

THE MISSION OF THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE:

MISSION COMMITTEE

2022 was a productive year for the Mission Committee. We were able to offer in-person events, as well as ways for our members to support worthy causes with financial donations and donations of tangible goods. We became a certified **Hunger Action Congregation** in the spring of 2022. This designation by Presbyterian Missions is proof of our commitment to help alleviate hunger and end its causes.

Through our monthly **Tend My Sheep** collections we supported: Green Magnet Elementary School (school supplies), Diaper Train (diapers), Green Chair Project (bathroom accessories), Note in the Pocket (pants), Capital Towers (toiletries), and Healing Transitions (toiletries). We also continued our support of the Food Bank, Interfaith Food Shuttle, and North Raleigh Ministries with the collection of tangible food items.

We continued our monthly **Special Offerings** with donations to: Capital Towers, Food Bank, Presbyterian Campus Ministries, North Raleigh Ministries, shelter ministries, and adult mission trip support. We also support many of our denomination's projects; One Great Hour of Sharing, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Peace and Global Witness, and Christmas Joy.

Hands-on volunteer opportunities included: HMPC members were able to volunteer their time at the Food Bank with regular dates set by the committee. We packaged breakfast bags for Meals on Wheels during events held at the church. Members continued to support Meals on Wheels by covering monthly driving routes. Hudson members returned to Avery County for an adult mission trip. We once again provided volunteers for the Habitat for Humanity Interfaith Build.



A \$25,000 donation was made to the Interfaith Food Shelter. (Photo to left.) These funds were possible due to an overage in the 2021 budget. These funds were presented to IFS representatives during worship on July 10. We designated this donation to be used to support a school food pantry for one year, for their senior grocery bag program, and for educational programs. Additional financial donations were made to the Food Bank, North Raleigh Ministries, Habitat for Humanity, Ukraine Relief, and to support PCUSA mission programs.

We facilitated four of the summer adult education weeks. We brought in

speakers from the Food Bank and Interfaith Food Shuttle. Members who attended our adult mission trip to Avery County spoke to the class about their experience. We also held a hands-on volunteer opportunity for our members during class. (Photo to right.)

HUDSON HANDY HELPERS

Hudson Handy Helpers (HHH) was started about six years ago as a result of a member with cancer asking for help with her home repairs. The church was supplying meals and transportation. Over the years we have helped both church members and others supported by Hudson Memorial, and have had outside requests from organizations such as Step-Up Ministries and Rebuilding Together of the Triangle, as well as individual friends of our congregation. Even during the pandemic, we have selectively and carefully responded.

We help people move into retirement communities, make donations to North Raleigh Ministries and ReStore, make dump runs, help older members with their yards, do minor home repairs, and consult



(if needed) where outside contractors are being hired. We have installed grab bars in bathrooms, built ramps and steps, replaced lights and faucets, picked up and delivered furniture and bedding.

Our congregation has been generous in supporting HHH and as a result funds have been used by the Mission Committee to fund local needs.

In 2022 we had 20+ men and women and teenagers in Handy Helpers on about 35-40 projects. It is important when we are helping for us to interact with the people we are helping. This is a blessing for the Helpers.

2022 was a very busy and productive year. Harry Bowles rotated off the committee as co-chair having extended his leadership by 13 months due to the pandemic. Gary Alexander agreed to remain as co-chair along with newly elected co-chair Steve Jesseph. Harry Bond joined the committee for 2 years, along with Glenn Grigg and Steve Jesseph for one year terms for the class of 2024.

Significant Projects Completed in 2022:

- Second Floor Admin Wing and Room 200 -- new ceiling and lighting installed
- Screening for the dumpster area installed
- A number of minor repairs to the facility, including roofing repairs at the Administration wing and the Narthex and repairs to the main sanctuary
- Sidewalk drains were added to alleviate flooding issues at the Memorial Garden
- Monitoring and participation in community meetings with NCDOT and the City of Raleigh regarding the planned widening of Six Forks Road
- A new drain system added next to the breezeway on the Six Forks Road side of the property to stop rainwater from flooding the east side of the building
- Significant improvements to the attics to allow for safer movement for members and contractors doing work in the attics
- A new HVAC contractor selected to repair and maintain our systems
- A number of electrical and plumbing problems addressed, including new electrical outlets in the Geneva Hall classrooms and repairs to the kitchen dishwasher
- A new pulpit was designed and ordered for the sanctuary, funded by memorial gifts
- Replaced an air conditioner/heat unit for the Karl Hudson room
- New wall-mounted TVs installed in Geneva Hall, Westminster Hall and Room 200; ceiling speakers added in WH

MEMORIAL GARDEN

Highlights from 2022 included completing the pergola over the patio in front of the new Columbarium, as well as adding new benches. The new plantings took hold and gave us a beautiful garden for church events, meditation, and a quiet space to enjoy God's beauty.

In 2022, there were purchases of 4 plaques for the Memorial Tablet, and 6 niches in the Columbarium. There are 61 niches available for members.

In 2023, plans are underway to complete the Memorial Garden design with the installation of a commissioned art sculpture and patio furniture, thanks to the Garden & Glass Campaign and special donations. This should be completed before the summer in 2023.

Westminster Hall Audio/Visual

New A/V equipment was put in service in 2022 as the final step of the renovation. First, **two 85" display screens** with powerful **Sonos speakers** were added and have been used for VBS, receptions, youth and children's activities, adult education classes, presentations and hybrid zoom meetings. Later in the year, a PA system with **15 JBL ceiling speakers**, **2 wireless microphones** and the ability to play music from any Bluetooth source was added to play in either half individually or both halves of the room together. The project was completed under budget thanks to the many volunteers who helped mount TVs, run cable and install ceiling speakers.





A 55" display screen was added to Geneva Hall for the fall Kick-off to add educational material from the internet to the hands-on instruction in the Children's and Youth programs. (See photo to left - Screen being used during music time!)


At the end of the year, advance work for an anticipated 2023 Network Upgrade was completed including upgrading building network cables to current speeds and bringing in Google Fiber to replace Spectrum for internet service. When completed, this

work is expected to pay for itself in 3 years from savings on internet and phone service and the maintenance cost of our local file server, as well as improving network reliability, speed and wifi coverage for all of our ministry programs.




THE 2022 GARDEN GLASS CAMPAIGN



In May and June of 2022, the congregation had a Session approved short-term capital campaign called Garden & Glass. The campaign raised funds for the following items: Four sanctuary windows plus a pergola, new seating, a sculpture, and reserve funds for maintenance and repairs for the Memorial Garden. The campaign was a wonderful success, raising over \$86,000 by 84 households. Special thanks to members Debbie Bumgarner and Lizzie Graybill for coordinating this campaign. As of the writing of this report, the sanctuary windows, pergola and benches have all been installed. Plans are set for more seating in the spring of 2023 and a sculpture installation by the summer of 2023. Thanks be to God!

HMPC FOUNDATION

The Foundation is administered by a Board of Directors. The current members of the Board are: Anish Banerjee, Nancy Brenner, Lynne Dawkins, Steve Guy, Don Haydon (President), Allie Maples (Secretary), Laura Perry (Treasurer), Don Slater, and Lou Yates (Vice President). Pastor Mac Schafer is the Staff Liaison.

The Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Foundation is the Church's endowment, or long-term investment vehicle. The Foundation was created as a separate corporation in 1978 to receive gifts, invest those gifts for long-term benefit, and make earnings from that investment available to supplement the annual operating budget and to fund critical projects. The Foundation Board of Directors seeks to balance the long-term goal of building up the endowment for the benefit of future generations, with the near-term goal of supporting needs for expanded outreach and mission, and for building projects.

The Foundation's funds are invested in the Vanguard Balanced Index Fund, which invests 60 percent in stocks and 40 percent in bonds. While the fund's share price increased significantly in prior years, its performance in 2022 reflected the broad investment market and realized a loss for the year. The total value of all Foundation monies at the end of 2022 totaled approximately \$1,200,000, as compared with \$1,461,000 at the end of 2021. Last year's results are disappointing, but the focus is on the long term.

In 2022, the Foundation provided \$30,000 to support the operating budget, and will be able to increase that support to almost \$43,000 in 2023. This contribution helps expand mission and outreach programs of the Church, beyond what might otherwise be afforded. In addition, in 2022 the Foundation approved grants to pay for renovation of second floor administration offices, piano repairs and tuning, and other property projects.

The Foundation Board also oversees the Memorial Gifts program. These gifts are given throughout the year in memory of Hudson members, whose families have asked that remembrances be designated



for the Church. The Board considers requests for use of Memorial Gifts funds to support projects or initiatives that cannot be funded within the annual operating budget.

The Board is thankful for the congregation's continued generous support of the Foundation. Previous additions to the endowment from the recent capital campaign, and gifts from the Ragan, Harris, Welby, and O'Rorke estates, and many other families have made it possible for the Foundation to significantly increase its financial support of the operating and capital budgets of the Church.

Gifts to the Foundation may be made through a wide variety of means, such as: cash gifts at any time (and some have found it rewarding to make annual donations on their birthdays); bequests of money or real property to the Church in wills; purchase of life insurance policies with the Church named as beneficiary; and other ways that are agreed by the Session and the Board.

A CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

ADULT EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Adult Ed members: Susan Bradshaw, Jay Cummins (Liaison and chair), Linda Meeks, and Lindsey Ogden work under the guidance of Pastor Kirk. Thanks to Ron Ash, Susie Bradshaw, Dottie Burch, and Keto Komono who faithfully served out their terms on the committee this May.

The Adult Education Committee, "Adult Ed", is responsible to the Session for ministering to the Christian nurture and faith formation of adults at HMPC working alongside the youth and children's ministry teams.

The wide scope of Adult Ed includes both lay and pastor led programs including Adult Sunday School, New Members classes, Coffee and Conversation, Sunday Night Book Study series, Presbyterian Pint, Seeing the Word, Brown Bag Lunch, Women at the Well, and Waking Up with the Word (...and more).

The new class year began in May getting initiated to the Matthew 25 initiative with the objective of providing best in class programming which leads to building congregational vitality and eradicating structural racism. We are positioned well to lead the educational efforts of Matthew 25 in that we have a solid mission carried out by a strong core group of educators providing a variety of options at various venues with a flexible approach.

Highlights of 2022 included a successful 12-week summer series including memorable Bible character skits (shout outs to Joanna, Lizzie, and Grace), a bee-keeper presentation (love those bees!), Hunger Action updates, Old and New Testament fundamentals, and the adult Mission Trip report from John Oldenberg. We also offered a special session on pilgrimage led by John Whisler and Carolyn Scott recounting their trip along the Camino de Santiago earlier in the year.

Kudos go out to all the leaders who helped guide the educational process while Mac was on sabbatical, and, if you happened to attend the early January combined Sunday School 9am program you were treated to a presentation by Mac on his trip to reformation sites in Germany and trek from Switzerland to Rome along the Via Francigena.

This Fall we expanded the Adult Sunday school offerings to include a 9 o'clock class that has focused on pilgrimage as its theme using videos, movies (Same Kind of Different Me and The Way), and discussion. The Presbyterian Ponderings class, a discussion group, has been working with the book Presbyterian Questions, Presbyterian Answers by Donald McKim and has had many lively discussions. The Seeker's class revolves around theological themes led by a crack team of facilitators (Susan Grigg, Rev. Jimmy Hulsey, Rev. Aleta Ash, and Ron Ash).

The 2023 first quarter programming is kicking off with gusto as the Nine O'Clock Class focuses on The Power Nine and the Blue Zones Projects, while the Seekers will be creating C.H.A.O.S. We encourage you to consider attending as we grow the participants in each offering.





PASTOR-LED ADULT FAITH FORMATION

WAKING UP WITH THE WORD (WUWTW) – WUWTW is a Men's Bible Study that meets weekly, alternating between Zoom and In-person on the Westminster Hall Patio. Special thanks to Fred Woodward & Ken Krause who led the in-person group, and Don Slater who led the Zoom group while Mac was on Sabbatical. This group met 51 times in 2022.

BROWN BAG LUNCH – The Brown Bag Lunch group studied Heaven & Hell: A History of the Afterlife by Bart D. Ehrman during the first half of 2022. The group did not meet the second half of 2022 while Pastor Mac was away on Sabbatical.



COFFEE & CONVERSATION was a new offering created in 2022. It is for parents of children and youth and goes on while children are in music and youth are in Sunday School after worship. Pastor Mac regularly taught and facilitated this group last spring and Cary Dickerson led it in the fall while Pastor Mac was on Sabbatical.

SEEING THE WORD – A Visio & Lectio Divina group that used the *St. John's Illuminated Bible*; it met once a month from January to July, then stopped due to Pastor Mac being on sabbatical. It restarted in January of 2023.



PRESBYTERIAN PINT – The Presbyterian Pint is a men's group that meets on the fourth Thursday of the month. They studied Being Reformed: The Theology of Presbyterian at the beginning of 2022. This group met once a month at Mordecai Beverage Company. Special thanks to John James who led the group from July through December.

LENTEN FRIDAY LABYRINTH WALKS IN THE CITY OF RALEIGH - Every Friday of Lent in 2022, Pastor Mac met members of Hudson for guided labyrinth walks at locations like Millbrook Baptist, Transitions LifeCare, St. Marks UMC, and more.



WOMEN AT THE WELL - Two groups, two times and formats, diverse groups of women of all ages and stages. Each of these groups had new church members join in 2022.

The Wednesday morning weekly group became a hybrid of inperson and online formats to accommodate group members. Each week approximately 18 women met in person with 4-6 online for conversation, reflections and prayer using a selected book as a guide. In 2022 we used *If God is Love Don't Be a Jerk* by John Pavlovitz and *Wholehearted Faith* by Rachel Held Evans. The group meets Sept-May.



The monthly group meets on one Thursday a month for dinner and discussion on the intersection of faith and life with a podcast or other online source providing content. This group has 26 women on the roster and gatherings range from 6 or 8 to twice that. Podcasts included selections by Kate Bowler, Brene Brown, Glennon Doyle, Bishop Michael Curry, Brian McLauren, Anne Lamott, David Lamotte, Diana Butler Bass, Barbara Brown Taylor, Krista Tippett, and John Meacham through NPR, podcasts, TED Talks and other online sources.

BOOK STUDIES - Debbie facilitates Sunday evening offerings on an occasional basis, typically one in the spring and one in the fall, meeting for 90 minutes and diving deeply into challenging topics related to peace and justice. In 2022 the spring series used *Holy Envy: Seeing God in the Faith of Others* by Barbara Brown Taylor and was attended by 14 people who considered the rich blessings in interfaith relationships. The fall selection was *How to Have an Enemy: Righteous Anger and The Work Of Peace* by Rev Melissa Florer-Bixler, pastor of Raleigh Mennonite Church. The Biblical witness as translated for our life and times was very challenging for the 8 participants, who found it helpful as we discern how to do the necessary work of addressing systemic issues, particularly those associated with race and gender.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY COMMITTEE

Cary Dickerson provides exceptional leadership in service to our children and families at Hudson. Among her strengths is her ability to maintain communication and coordinate programming with both the church and preschool staff. Cary has been instrumental in establishing very successful program and fellowship opportunities for our children and families. She is creative, but is also caring and nurturing. She not only guides the faith journey of our children, but models the Christian life for them.

A new Joyful Noise music program for children is being led by Rich Richards and Barbara Loehr-Fox. While the children practice with Rich and Barbara, parents meet together for a time of conversation and fellowship. With considerable expertise and patience, Rich and Barbara have inspired our children and the congregation as a whole with their musical gifts. Our Christmas children's pageant this year was again a blessing. We had enthusiastic participation from children of



all ages in this ageless story of Christmas, and their contributions to worship throughout the year are inspirational.



Our Vacation Bible School experience was another resounding success with 80 children in attendance and more than 40 volunteers. Cary's

leadership from initial planning in early 2022 to the August week and afterward was the key to that success. Through music, art, Bible study, science and recreation, the children learned how the light in our lives that comes from faith enables us to shine our light as inspiration to others. We traveled each day to "Adventure Island" to experience together the love, joy, trust and hope that comes from faith.

Other highlights of the year included our annual Easter Egg Hunt where over 1000 eggs were hidden and children celebrated Easter through crafts and games.

- June through September-modified Intinction
- October-traditional passing of the bread and cup
- November-modified Intinction
- December-traditional passing of the bread and cup
- Christmas Eve, 8 pm service-traditional Intinction resumed (dipping of the bread in the chalice)

When a visitor walks into our sanctuary, when someone makes an inquiry about our congregation, Hudson Connects is part of the team who welcomes them to Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Church. Such people, whether by accident or by the will of God, are seeking a place to believe and to belong. Along with pastors and other church staff/members, we strive to offer opportunities for that to be possible. Our task is to quide new members in assimilating into the life of the congregation and to assist all members in continuing and enriching their involvement. We have worked closely this year with Rev. Dr. Kirk to make contact with all those who have attended the Inquirers Class. We have participated in the Zoom class sessions and have followed up by email or personal conversation with each one. Thirty adults became members of our congregation in 2022 and we have nurtured connections as we walk with them in "finding their places" at HMPC. We believe these connections are powerful and work to make us community. New members continue to be of varied ages and stages and household configurations. We observe that many are already participating here when they decide to intentionally pursue membership: they attend worship; they may have children and youth connected to those programs; they have joined one of the faith formation groups; they attend fellowship activities. We believe this important and are intentionally encouraging this process. Many find us initially through our live stream worship.

As we look to 2023, we will be gathering for a planning meeting to assess what we have been doing and evaluate what we may need to amend. We will consider what changes are desirable so that we can be more effective in honoring our commitment connecting members to one another and to the ministries they find most valuable.

Over the past year HMP has emerged from the shadow of Covid!



We began 2022 with drop-off and pick-up at the door. As numbers moved in a positive direction in the spring, we were able to drop the indoor mask requirement. Each staff member was supported in the personal decision of whether they chose to continue wearing a mask or not.

We transitioned to parents coming in the building for pick-up in June. This change was well received as some parents had never been in the building. The door drop-off has continued with parents coming in for pick-up. Parents are welcome to come to enter the school but the majority appreciate the convenience of door drop-off.

Registration for the 2022-2023 school year was challenging; tours were limited as some prospective parents still did not feel comfortable coming in person. Most of our classes were close to capacity with waiting lists in the infants and toddlers. We have 15 classrooms and 40 staff members.



Our summer program was great! Somewhat challenging with staffing but we ended up with a strong crew. We did not offer the single week in August; less than 5 teachers took us up on the offer to work to make up for the change.

Fall kick-off was strong: We held an in person Open House, Back to School pizza night and a Scholastic book fair all in September. The school earned enough "scholastic dollars" to order three birch cabinets valued at \$400 each, we are still awaiting delivery. We also had a large part in updating Geneva Hall. We had Geneva Hall painted and had a large monitor installed, replacing the projector.
