# World Communion Sunday & Children's Sabbath

**10:30am Worship:** World Communion Sunday, celebrated by the PC(USA) and other denominations on the first Sunday of October, is a day to celebrate global Christian unity and oneness in Christ through the sacrament of Holy Communion. This tradition first began in 1930. Today, it serves as an opportunity to share in the universal Christian practice of communion, reflecting on unity with believers across all cultures and backgrounds.



The children and youth will help lead worship by assisting in liturgy and sharing world music. Pastor Marguerite will preach a sermon called "What It Takes" based on Lamentations 1:3-6, 3:19-26, and 2 Timothy 1:1-7.

**In the afternoon:** Hudson is sending 60 volunteers of all ages to the Rise Against Hunger Warehouse to package 12,000 meals to help those in need around the world. This is part of our mission as a Hunger Action Congregation.

# 11:30am - Presbyterians & Executive Power: Lessons from Scotland





Join us in Westminster Hall after worship for Scottish fare, fellowship, and a presentation from Mark and Marguerite Sirrine. "Executive Power" is very much in the news these days. Presbyterians, and indeed all people, have a long history of wrestling with how much power to invest in individual rulers versus elected representatives - not just in government, but in the church as well! Join Marguerite and Mark while they share what they learned in tracing Marguerite's maternal and paternal ancestors from Glasgow/Northern Ireland and the Isle of Arran, Scotland. What possessed them to leave their native land in 1718 and 1774? What political, economic, and material realities influenced their decision? Why did their descendants dedicate their lives to the American Revolution and the American experiment? The answers link us surprisingly to today's headlines.

# What is Brunch Church? Brunch + Church!

As Pastor Marguerite introduced in last week's Window, we are looking forward to Hudson's first Brunch Church on Sunday, Nov. 9, beginning at 9:30 am. What to expect? Come hungry for brunch and hungry for a worship experience to help us hear God's plan for Hudson. We will gather in Westminster Hall. Over a delicious brunch catered by Panera, we will have fellowship and begin to share our thoughts about the future of our church with old and new friends. Members of the Mission Study Team will be available to help guide the discussions.

We will begin worship right where we are with congregational singing, prayer, confession, and scripture, with individual and group responses. We will learn what a vision statement is and read and discuss examples. Worship will continue with prayer. In small groups, we will consider who we are called to be as a community and how we will serve Christ. The responses to these questions will become vision statements to be shared with the assembled congregation. Differences and similarities among the shared statements will emerge and we will seek consensus on major points.

#### More details:

Brunch is furnished by the Mission Study Team—no need to bring anything or pay. Some vegetarian and gluten-free options will be available.



Children are welcome to eat with their families and participate. There will be some children's activities, and the nursery will be open for smaller children.

You will be receiving more information from the Mission Study Team between now and November, including insights from the congregation's CAT survey and details from the demographic and community studies. We hope these will stimulate ideas and discussion about Hudson's strengths and needs as well as community needs.

# Offering Of Letters: Faith In Action To End Hunger

On September 28, the Mission Team welcomed 41 Hudson congregants to participate in HMPC's annual Offering of the Letters. For the first time, we were thrilled to welcome middle and high school participants. Also, three non-member guests joined us. Fifteen participants wrote to both Senators and their Representatives. Thirteen wrote two letters, some dividing these between Representatives and Senators, and others writing both Senators. The letters requested that the government continue the SNAP benefits which were previously cut in a piece of national legislation. In total, 84 letters were written and will be sent to the Senators and Congressmen/women in the next ten days. This was the largest group we have had to write letters and we thank each person who participated. If you were unable to participate, you can still write to your US Senator or Congressional Representative. We pray for the over 600,000 people in Central and Eastern North Carolina, about 18% of the population, who are food insecure. Thank you for the letters that speak up for them.


The school's namesake, Frankie Lemmon (pictured on left), son of Frank Lemmon, was born with Down syndrome in the 1960's. When Frankie became of age to begin kindergarten, there was no school in the area that would accept children with special education needs. To fill this void, Frankie's

father, minister of Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Church, and the congregation united with the community to create Hudson Memorial Kindergarten, which went through many changes and moves, and eventually became the current Frankie Lemmon School & Developmental Center in Raleigh.

# Update on Associate Pastor Position

This past summer, we shared that Session had asked the Personnel Team to explore whether it was the right time to fill the Associate Pastor position. We'd like to let you know where that stands.

Our Presbytery has encouraged us to wait until a new Head of Staff is called before adding another pastor. That counsel makes sense. A lot has changed in our church and in Wake County since we last filled this role in 2005, and we want to shape our staff to meet today's opportunities, not yesterday's.

To do that, Session has formed a group to learn from other churches in our area about how they are staffing for ministry in 2025 and beyond. We're also building space into our 2026 budget for a position that may look different than before, making sure we are financially ready when the time is right.

In the meantime, Rev. Marguerite Sirrine and the Personnel Team are carefully reviewing the Associate Pastor's former responsibilities—deciding what can be reassigned and what might be set aside—so that our ministries remain focused on what matters most.

We know staff transitions can feel uncertain, but they can also be a time for renewal. Our goal is not simply to replace what was, but to shape a staff team that will help us grow as a community of faith—deepening our worship, strengthening care for one another, and serving our neighbors in meaningful ways.



Thank you for your prayers, patience, and support as we walk through this season. We welcome your questions and your insights as together we discern the best way forward.

#### What is the annual "Pledge Campaign" / "Giving Campaign"?

Each Fall, HMPC calls on its members and regular visitors to "pledge" their planned giving amount for the upcoming year. Everyone's pledged totals are then added together to set the church's budget for January 1 – December 31, 2026.

#### Why does HMPC request my annual pledge?

An annual pledge is a Christian practice of gratitude to God. We celebrate God's abundance in our lives and commit to giving a portion back to the church to glorify God and participate in God's mission at HMPC in the coming year.

#### What is funded by my pledged annual giving?

Everything at Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Church is made possible with your prayerful giving, including staff salaries, building and grounds upkeep, and all church ministries such as Music, Worship, Children and Youth, Mission Outreach, and Adult Education. HMPC receives no operational funds from Presbytery or our denomination.

#### How do I submit my pledge for 2026?

There are several options to submit your 2026 planned giving amount to HMPC:


#### What and when is "Commitment Sunday?"

Commitment Sunday is November 2, 2025, and this is the day by which HMPC asks for 2026 pledges to be submitted. HMPC encourages a tradition on Commitment Sunday for the symbolic placement of pledge brochures into the offering plate, though the majority of 2026 pledges are received earlier during the Pledge Campaign.

#### Could you tell me more about the theme verse for this year's Giving Campaign?

Luke 11:9 - ASK, and it will be given to you; SEEK, and you will find; KNOCK, and the door will be opened to you.

HMPC is navigating a transformational time, supported by the career experience and guidance of Marguerite Sirrine as our Transitional Pastor. Marguerite's summer series of worship lessons focused on Mission and Vision, and key verses that offer guidance through times of uncertainty. Marguerite's lesson series helped us to discern the difference between Mission and Vision, and why God provides us examples of both when facing an outcome that is yet unknown.



The core themes of Luke 11:9 are persistent prayer, diligent engagement to understand God's will, and active faith to trust in God's generosity. The verse, "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you," forms a structural part of Jesus' teaching to his disciples who seek instruction.

#### **The Mission of Persistent Prayer\***



**Asking**: To ask involves openly communicating with God as an earnest practice of faith and trust in His wisdom.



**Seeking**: To seek is a deeper, more active pursuit of God's truth, involving diligent searching and engagement with God's word.



**Knocking**: To knock is the unwavering perseverance of listening for God's will even when an immediate answer does not seem close at hand.

#### The Vision of God's Generosity\*

- A Promise of Response: The repetition of "ask," "seek," and "knock" is a framework for consistent and earnest effort that will ultimately reveal God's blessings and guidance.
- Personal Growth and Trust: Engaging in persistent prayer fosters spiritual growth, cultivates trust and patience, and deepens our understanding of God's purpose.
- Alignment with God's Will: Through the practice of "ask," "seek," and "knock," believers gain confidence that God will provide direction, leading to a path forward that is aligned with God's will.

The framework of "ask," "seek," and "knock" is given to reveal God's Mission and Vision in times of uncertainty. Jesus' words and teachings from the Old Testament demonstrate the importance to persistently seek God's will. We are taught to keep going, even when it's hard.\*
