Welcome Back to Church!

A Message from Pastor Marguerite

After another record-setting travel season this summer, many of us are returning back to work, school, and church for the fall. During September at Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Church, we are celebrating the theme of "welcome" by starting a fall worship theme focusing on the three parts of our vision statement: We seek to welcome with the love of Christ, trust in the grace of Christ, and grow with the help of Christ.

I really love the vision this statement casts and the questions it raises, which we've been discussing in our Welcome team meetings. All of us have a different vision of what it means to be welcomed. Some want to be seen, introduced, and invited right away. Others want to come in without being "pestered," experience and observe the church at work, then process our experience afterwards. Some of us have gone to churches who in their desperation for new members welcome too much and "accost" visitors with a lot of attention and demands. Others of us have visited churches multiple times where nobody has spoken to us or noticed us, and that felt off-putting. So welcoming actually requires wisdom and discernment, which your Welcome team is hoping to help all of us live into this September. Throughout the month they will be serving as liturgists and offering some tips on how we welcome at HMPC.

As we move into Giving season for most of October, your Giving team has been hard at work launching the 2027 campaign with a great theme and inspirational artwork by Lesley Ash-Jacobsen. It will be a time to thank God for the ways we've made an impact in people's lives this year and to trust in the grace of Christ as we plan to give our resources for next year.

Finally, November will focus on how we grow with the help of Christ. Grow how, you ask? I can't wait to see how the Holy Spirit leads us to find out!

Creating a Culture of Welcome



When people come to worship, they often decide within minutes whether they feel comfortable enough to return. A welcoming church is built not through large gestures, but through hundreds of small moments of hospitality.

Many church members assume that being welcoming means walking up to a visitor and introducing themselves. While introductions can be valuable, there are many other ways to make people feel seen, valued, and comfortable.

Make Eye Contact and Acknowledge Them

A smile, simple nod, wave, or "Good morning" lets someone know they have been noticed and welcomed.

Hold the Door Open

Holding a door open is a small act that communicates care and consideration.

Wear Your Nametag

This makes you more approachable and can reduce social anxiety in others.

Pass the Friendship Pad

This allows you to know who is worshiping alongside you and helps guests sign in so they can be contacted by the church office.

Offer a Helpful Direction

If you see someone looking uncertain, simply saying, "Fellowship is just down the hall," or "The restrooms are down that hallway" can ease anxiety.

Invite Someone to Sit Near You

A simple gesture and words like, "There's plenty of room here," can help a guest avoid the awkwardness of searching for a seat.

Help Families with Young Children

Offer an encouraging smile rather than a frustrated look when children make noise. Parents often feel self-conscious when visiting a new church.

Introduce Others Instead of Yourself

If you know both a church member and a guest, help connect them by saying, "I'd love for you to meet Sarah." This takes pressure off the newcomer.

Sit in different areas of the Sanctuary

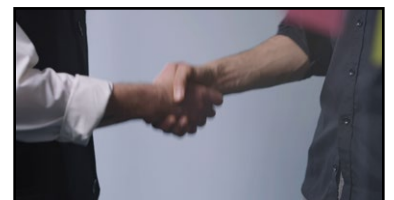
Many of us have our "favorite spot" where we always sit, but sitting in a new area might give you a new perspective and allow you to interact with new people. This includes sitting toward the front!

End the Visit with Kindness

As people leave, offer a simple farewell such as, "Have a great week," "Thanks for coming," or "Hope to see you again."

Small Actions, Big Impact

Many people arrive at church carrying burdens that are invisible to everyone around them. Some are nervous. Some are grieving. Some are searching for hope. Others are simply wondering whether they belong. A smile, a seat invitation, an open door, a helpful direction, or a few encouraging words may seem insignificant, but together they communicate something powerful: "You matter to us, and we're glad you're here." Together, we can make Christ's welcome visible to everyone who walks through our doors.

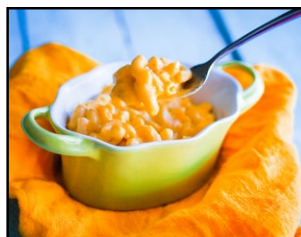

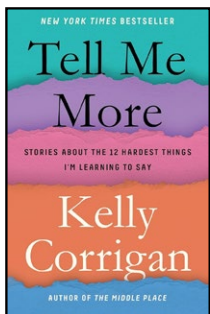

Coffee & Conversation A Time for Young-ish Adults Following Worship - Resumes Sept. 20



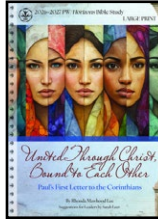
